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



BOXERS IN THE RING

The new Boxer combat reconnaissance vehicles are being put to the test in the largest exercise the vehicle has been operated in since its introduction into the Army. The A Sqn 2/14LHR (QMI) vehicles are being used in the 7 Bdeled Exercise Diamond Walk at the Shoalwater Bay Training Area. Tpr Harrison Dietrich, a gunner on the Boxer, said the crews had adapted well to the new capability. "We have just conducted a battle run with the hatches down, which has been a first for the troop," Tpr Dietrich said. "It was a case of walking through the complexities of a hatch-down environment. It's also been about adapting and trying to work out the best way to employ the Boxer.

"Lt Riley Brassil previously worked with the vehicle the Boxer is replacing: the Australian Light Armoured Vehicle. He said the crews had shown great initiative and technical mastery in the way they had adapted to the new vehicle platform, which was unlike anything they had worked with before. "In a vehicle that has so many sensors and digital systems, you find that you have so much more to work with and your mind is stretched between a few different lines of effort," Lt Brassil said. "However, if you can pull that all together and work with the crew as a whole, the Boxer is extremely effective at doing its job."

OC A Sqn Maj Daniel Solomon said the crews enjoyed taking the Boxer into the field after extensive theory-based training in the barracks. "This has been our first opportunity for this training year to take the Boxer into the field as part of its introduction into the Army," Maj Solomon said. "Diamond Walk has been an opportunity for us to go back to basics, and the couple of weeks we have been out here has seen us achieve dry and live-fire individual crew certification, and up to troop certification live-fire." Maj Solomon said the Boxer had already demonstrated its superiority in the short amount of time 2/14LHR (QMI) had worked with it. "So far, people have been quite impressed by the performance of the Boxers," he said. "We have constantly pushed the boundaries of the Boxer, trying to push it further and further, and so far it's responding very well."



The Australia Army History Unit's Paul McAlonan looks back 50 years to Operation Overlord at Long Khanh.

In early June 1971, Australian forces in Vietnam conducted a major deployment into southern Long Khanh Province. The aim was to prevent a potential large-scale offensive by a strong force of North Vietnamese Army and Viet Cong main force units into the 1 Australian Task Force (1ATF) area of operations in the Phuoc Tuy Province.

This operation, named Overlord, was so large in scale that the majority of the combat resources of 1ATF were committed, as well as supporting US Army units, leaving only workshop and service support personnel at Nui Dat to defend the 1ATF base.

After being inserted into Long Khanh Province (30km north of the Nui Dat task force base) by helicopter on June 6, B Coy, 3RAR, quickly discovered a previously unknown complex of enemy bunkers 500m from the landing zone. Not wishing to engage the enemy in failing light, they withdrew to a night harbour and directed mortar and artillery fire onto the enemy positions throughout the night.

The next day at 6.30am, B Coy, led by 5 Platoon, assaulted the bunker system and immediately came under heavy fire from three sides. The understrength platoon, with only 27 soldiers, attacked the bunkers without armour support as the B Coy OC thought that the sound of the armour moving during the night would cause the enemy to abandon their positions.

The fire was so intense it took two hours for the rest of B Coy to join 5 Platoon.

The intensity of the engagement meant that the infantry had to receive resupplies by air. During one of these, a RAAF Iroquois was shot down, killing two of the crew.

Centurions sent to support B Coy contacted the bunkers 800m from the infantry and came under heavy fire.

By 9.30am, with damage from RPG fire, wounded crewman and low on ammunition, the tanks halted to allow a resupply to occur and for D Coy to join them. They were not able to meet B Coy until 5.30pm, by which time the majority of the enemy had fled leaving only a small delaying force.

It was noted in the aftermath of the battle that the 105mm artillery rounds had minimal effect on the bunkers and the only one destroyed was from a direct hit from a 155mm round.

Over the next few days there was only sporadic contact until June 12 when three armoured personnel carriers (APCs) were ambushed. During this contact, an RPG round struck an external bin containing Claymore mines, which detonated and killed seven Australians, severely wounded another three and badly damaged the APC.

Five hours later another troop of APCs were ambushed with RPG and Claymore fire, with one being extensively damaged when an RPG penetrated, critically wounding the crew commander.

Tank rolls out of retirement



AFTER sitting in a paddock near Mingenew for 15 years, this 1942 vintage General Grant tank is looking pretty good for its age.

They are members of the Light Aid

Detachment of the 10th Light Horse, one of the state's most famous regiments.

The tank served with the 2/10th Armoured Division of WA in the 1940s as it prepared to defend WA from the feared Japanese invasion during World War II.

Like many of its kind, the tank was retired to a farm for clearing and was eventually laid to rest and rust until it was

tracked down by Mr Deykin, a former commander of the 10th Light Horse.

The tank will now be kept on display at Irwin Barracks at Karrakatta after a small parade and presentation yesterday.

It was the tank's first public appearance since it rattled down St Georges Terrace in 1942.
